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#### Chapter 1

### A Call To Be King 1 Samuel 16

#### INTRODUCTION:

Some of the most exciting stories in the Bible are centered around the history of the kings. It is true that these kings were either good and faithful or extremely evil, and God responded to them as they ruled His people. The kings of the Bible were involved in battles of war, riches, sins of the flesh, and even in idolatry.

In this book, we wish to focus in on one of these kings, "David, the Sweet Singer of Israel." From the beginning, David was a great king! Yes, he had his moments when he was weak, but when his life is placed on God's scales of righteousness, he is designated as "A man after God's own heart," (Acts 13:22). Let us begin by studying how David, a shepherd boy was anointed king of Israel.

#### **Call Him From the Fields**

As the sun in the eastern horizon made known its brilliance over the valley of Bethlehem many years ago, it found a young shepherd boy watching his father's sheep. To David, this was just another day of work with the sheep, but God had different plans for him. May we leave David with his sheep for a few moments to learn what God was planning.

Saul was the king of God's people at this time. However, he had lived in disobedience, and in the eyes of the Lord, disobeying is wrong whether the guilty one is a beggar or king! Thus, Samuel, a great prophet of God, was instructed to anoint another king for Israel. His instructions were to visit the house of Jesse the Bethlehemite: "For I have provided Myself a king among his sons" (v. 2). "Take a heifer with you, and say, 'I have come to sacrifice to the Lord.' Then invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will show you what you shall do; you shall anoint for Me the one I name to you" (vss. 2,3). Even though Samuel feared King Saul, he feared the Lord even more, and he made haste to obey.

It must have been a thrill for Jesse to learn that one of his sons would be a king. Just imagine how these boys dressed themselves with the best clothing possible. In fact, they were dressed so well and appeared so strong and brave that it was no doubt difficult for Samuel to make a choice. Finally though, he looked upon Eliab and said, "Surely the Lord's anointed is before Him" (v. 6). However, the Lord said to Samuel, "Do not look at his appearance or at the height of his stature, because I have refused him. For the Lord does not see as man sees; for man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart" (v. 7).

LESSON: At this point, Samuel was choosing based on his own feelings without the guidance of God. Remember, man's ways are not God's ways. It is certainly strange that Samuel, after being

so deceived by Saul's countenance and stature, could be so forward to judge a man by this rule. When man chooses a king, he looks at his outward appearance, but God looks at his heart.

Have you ever neglected a certain classmate because he or she was not the most attractive, but later found them to be the best? Jesus was refused as king by many because He did not appear physically as they imagined, but truly He was the Son of God! Yes, the heart is what is most important. The apostle Peter expressed it in these words: "But let it be the hidden person of the heart, with the incorruptible ornament of a gentle and quiet spirit, which is very precious in the sight of God" (1 Peter 3:4).

After Eliab was refused, there appeared the other six who were present, but Samuel said very firmly that the Lord had not chosen them. This must have come as a great shock to Jesse, and he may have wondered if some mistake had been made. At this point, the prophet asked, "Are all the young men here?" (v. 11). Jesse must have felt that these were the most important ones, however, it was a fact that he had one other son in the field tending sheep. Therefore, after hearing about this last son, Samuel requested that he be brought to him at once. When David was called and made his appearance, surely it was a shock to imagine this young shepherd boy as a king. How is he described? He had a clear, fair complexion, a good eye, and a lovely face. The Lord immediately said, "Arise, anoint him; for this is the one!" (v. 12). With this instruction from the Lord, "Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him in the midst of his brothers; and

the Spirit of the Lord came upon David from that day forward" (v. 13).

LESSON: Notice that David was asked to appear for the purpose of being anointed. If we have the proper skills and abilities today, we do not have to go around boasting and telling others what we can do. Strength has a way of making itself known without the help of self-praise. David didn't even attend the feast, but he was still anointed king! Don't ever boast of your abilities, but rather show them by your life to others. The Bible teaches this principle--take a lower seat and then if you are worthy, you will be invited to a higher one. It is much easier to go upward when invited than to step downward when rejected. Let us spend our time WORKING and we will not be guilty of BOASTING. It has been said that "Usually the greatest boasters are the smallest workers. The deep rivers pay a larger tribute to the sea than shallow brooks, and yet empty themselves with less noise" (Secker).

The anointing of David as king was not at first made known to King Saul. The word of God tells us that the Spirit of the Lord departed from Saul. Surely it was an empty feeling to loose the Spirit of God. It seems that any person (young or old) living without God does not have a special purpose for life! Saul had known the power of God guiding his steps, but now disobedience has brought him rejection and sorrow.

LESSON: God does not come down directly today as He did during the days of Saul, but He is still present in the hearts of His people. If God and His grace

do not rule us, sin and Satan will possess us, and will leave us torn without the favor of God. How can any accountable person live another day without obeying the commands of the Lord to become a Christian? How can a soul fall into the condition of King Saul and still be content?

Saul became so miserable that he needed a physician to help him during this time of emptiness and the loss of God. Even if he could have received modern medical attention, such would have been useless. To help him, it was recommended that he find a man who was a cunning player of the harp. Music is a wonderful therapy, but it will not answer God's command to repent. Saul needed to approach God to confess his sins before Him, and then the music would have helped him to rejoice that he had returned to God.

David was known for his ability to play the harp, and thus was chosen as the one to cheer the king. By the guidance of God, David accepted the task of trying to please the king. This gave him the opportunity to learn the palace and to get a taste of his approaching position as God's ruling king.

LESSON: Music is a wonderful art, but it will not do the impossible. It will cheer a saddened heart when all seems gray, it will help us face many problems from day to day, but God never intended for it to forgive the sinner from the error of his way. Forgiveness must come through obedience and then music will help keep our hearts free from despair. In the spiritual realm, we can lift our voices in praise to God through singing. In our daily lives (apart from

worship) we can enjoy good, clean music as great musicians play. However, our whole lives become rich and complete, only with God!

Of all the arts beneath the heaven,
That man has found or God has given,
None draws the soul so sweet away;
As music's melting, mystic lay;
Slight emblem of the bliss above,
It soothes the spirit all to love.

(Hogg).

Music certainly had its place in David's time, but it would not bring Saul back to his God. First become Christians and then enjoy the heart cheering art of music. As David's skillful fingers danced across the strings of the harp, Saul was temporarily relieved of distress, but he needed to be relieved permanently of a rebelling heart toward God! However, David found favor in the eyes of this evil man, and King Saul was (at least for a time) refreshed by his presence.

#### Chapter 2

### The Winner By a Knockout

#### 1 Samuel 17

At the conclusion of spending some time with Saul as his harp player, David returned to his father's house to herd sheep. He was still but a youth, but he had the trust, faith, and determination of many adults. At the time of this lesson, war had broken out between Israel (God's people) and the Philistines. Even though Saul had lost favor in the eyes of God, he was still leading God's army. Three of David's brothers, Eliab, Abinadab, and Shammah, joined Saul's army to fight the Philistines, but David was too young and stayed at home to tend the flock of his father.

After the Philistines and Israel had prepared forty days for battle, Jesse sent David to the camp of Israel to take his brothers some parched corn, ten loaves of bread, and ten cheeses. David got up early in the morning to do his work.

LESSON: When there is a job to be done, we should get up early and apply ourselves. Laziness can become a disease that makes us truly failures. When daylight begins hiding the dark shadows of night, God's little feathered creatures begin their singing and work. We need to do the same. There is something refreshing and inspiring about the smell of the early morning dew.

When David reached the battlefield, he immediately heard that God's army was being defied by so-called champion, Goliath. He was a giant approximately eleven feet tall. He was dressed in an armor of protection which would shield him from any ordinary man. These startling facts, I'm sure, kept any soldier of Israel from accepting the challenge. The giant would cry out, "Why have you come out to line up for battle? Am I not a Philistine, and vou the servants of Saul? Choose a man for vourselves, and let him come down to me. If he is able to fight with me and kill me, then we will be your servants" (vss. 8,9). However, even at his appearance, Saul's men would run. David could not understand their actions because they were on God's side, and David knew that God would help this army (with Saul) to win.

LESSON: Too often we try to solve our problems without considering God and His power. Remember, nothing (within God's will) is impossible with God! David knew that God would help Saul and this army win.

When David's oldest brother heard how David was talking, his jealousy was kindled. He began mocking David, even though David had been kind, and had carried a load of food for his brothers. Eliab accused him of coming there only to see the battle. He emphasized to all who would listen that David was only a little shepherd boy.

LESSON: One of the problems that parents face is to help their children get along with each other. The older should be made to realize that the younger are looking to them for guidance. Brothers and sisters can be very cruel to each other, but usually they object when others are cruel. They usually fight for each other.

Word finally reached Saul of what David was saying and Saul sent for him to appear. David immediately asked for permission to meet the Giant in combat. Saul's first objection rested on the fact that David was only a youth. Saul failed to realize that youth can do great things when God is on their side. Therefore, David informed Saul of how a bear and lion entered the sheep one time and he was able to slay both of them. He also pointed out that the same power that permitted this success would give him victory in slaying the Giant. Saul said to David, "Go, and the Lord be with you!" (v. 37).

Saul provided David with an armor, but David refused to use it. It appears that he wanted to meet the giant with the same armor that he had used when meeting the bear and lion. Thus, with a staff in his hand, five smooth stones from the brook, and a sling, he was arrayed for battle.

LESSON: That which was so small and insignificant became strong and effective when used for God. We may not have talents to compare with an outstanding preacher, song director, or Bible teacher, but we can still do wonders for God. Our talents, though

small as David's weapons, can lead thousands to Christ. Instead of complaining about how weak we are, let us use our strength to do as much good as possible. You will be surprised at the results!

The giant was humiliated when he saw David and said, "Am I a dog, that you come to me with sticks?" (v. 43). Then he began cursing David by his gods. After this cursing, Goliath said, "Come to me, and I will give your flesh to the birds of the air and the beasts of the field!" (v. 44). However, this did not frighten David. He just assured the giant that Jehovah would help him kill him that day. "This day the Lord will deliver you into my hand, and I will strike you and take your head from you" (v. 46).

As they walked closer to each other, David reached into the bag where he carried the stones, took a stone, and placed it in his sling. With a few whirls he turned the stone loose and buried it in the forehead of the giant. Although he had stood tall and had boasted loudly, he fell tumbling to the earth. David ran and stood upon the Philistine, removed Goliath's sword, and cut off the giant's head. Therefore, by the help of God, a large army was defeated and a young shepherd boy became a hero.

LESSON: Sometimes adults make youth feel that God does not have a full time place for them in His work until they are older. We often speak of youth being the church of tomorrow. This is true, but isn't it also true that older youth must be a part of the church today? When young people reach the age of

accountability, they need to become workers for Jesus! They need to do as David, begin helping with the work of the Lord. Youth can learn how to help with the singing, Lord's Supper, bulletin, passing out tracts, visiting the sick, and praying. Many adults are lazy in the church today because they were taught the pattern of "do-nothing" while young. Youth needs to be given work, to be guided, and then like David they can become heroes in the Lord's army.

#### **Chapter 3**

#### **Run For Your Life**

#### 1 Samuel, 18 - 31

It is natural that David became a hero after slaving Goliath. He had stepped into the shoes of the king and had performed an essential duty for the saving of Israel. It could have been a temptation for David to become conceited, but this was not the case. He still looked to Saul as his earthly master and king even though the people praised David more highly than Saul. When David and Saul returned from slaying Philistines, the women danced, sang, and played instruments of music as they passed by. While doing this they compared Saul to David by saying, "Saul has his thousands, and David his thousands" (18:7). Even though David did not have anything to do with such, from this point forward, Saul began hating David.

LESSON: Many times, people suffer because of things they cannot help. Have you ever been guilty of mocking people who have physical handicaps or who have a different color skin? This is very wrong! In the old West, some people hated all Indians because some Indians were evil. David wanted to be a friend to Saul, but Saul would not permit it.

A short time later, Saul and David were sitting together as David played the harp. An evil spirit

entered Saul and he threw a spear at him and said, "I will pin David to the wall with it" (18:11). This happened twice, but David managed to avoid being harmed each time.

Another attempt on David's life came when Saul plotted to make David think he was his friend by offering Michal, his daughter, to David for wife. Of course, the daughter was not given without risking David's life. He was to pay Saul "one hundred foreskins of the Philistines, to take vengeance on the king's enemies" (18:25). Saul thought David would be killed in carrying out this assignment, but he was wrong. Instead of one hundred, David presented to Saul two hundred without any harm to himself from the battle. Thus, David became a son-in-law to Saul.

#### A True Friend

David had one true friend, Jonathan the son of Saul, and when his father plotted to kill David, Jonathan warned him. He even convinced his father on one occasion not to seek the life of David since he had saved Israel by slaying the giant, but Saul soon broke his promise and began seeking David as before. It is also interesting to note that David's wife (Michal) helped him escape the slaying hand of Saul by letting him down through a window, and by making an image to place in her husband's bed (19:11-16). When Saul's men came to capture him, she told them he was sick. Later, they took the image from his bed to Saul and he was angry with his daughter for allowing David, his enemy, to escape. However, she told her father, "He said to me, 'Let me go! Why should I kill you?"

(19:17). Still, Saul must have known that his daughter was against him.

A few days later Jonathan made a plan with David wherein he could let him know when his father was angry or peaceful. The plan was for David to hide near a place where Jonathan would shoot three arrows as though target practicing. He would bring a lad with him to go after the arrows. If he shot the arrows beyond to the extent that he would tell the lad, "Look, the arrows are beyond you," then his father was angry. If he would say, "Look, the arrows are on this side of you; get them and come," his father would be peaceful (20:20-23). After Saul attempted to slay Jonathan because of his concern for David, the arrow message was for David to run from the anger of his father.

LESSON: A good loyal friend is like a precious jewel. He or she will stand by you when your life is bright or when things go wrong. Jonathan helped his friend David in so many ways. Solomon wrote, "A man who has friends must himself be friendly, but there is a friend who sticks closer than a brother" (Proverbs 18:24).

To show you how much Saul wanted to slay David, he had Ahimelech, a priest, and many other priests slain, because he (Ahimelech) gave to David bread and the sword of Goliath. Saul had an evil servant, Doeg, and he said to him, "You turn and kill the priests! So Doeg the Edomite turned and struck the priests, and killed on that day eighty-five men who wore a linen ephod" (22:18).

LESSON: Hatred and jealousy can eat our hearts away, and they will grow if we allow such. Therefore, when you are tempted to carry a grudge, stop and remember Saul. It was disobedience, hatred, and jealousy that destroyed him and all of his hopes for the future.

The next time Saul and David came together was in a cave. David slipped close enough to Saul to cut off the corner of his robe without him knowing it. However, later, David's conscience began to pain him, and he followed Saul from a distance and cried out to the king that he could have slain him, but he did not. David tried hard to convince Saul that he had no evil in his heart toward him. Saul pretended to become friends to David, but it was ONLY pretense!

#### **David Marries Abigail**

There was a woman named Abigail who was married to an evil man named Nabal. David asked a favor of him, but he refused. Therefore, David considered slaying him, but Abigail helped him see that this would be wrong. However, after a few days God struck Nabal with death, and David then married Abigail.

#### **Hatred Continued**

Saul could not forget his hate for David and began once again seeking his life. David found Saul and his army camped and sound asleep. He slipped near Saul, took his sword and a jug of water, but again spared his life. The next morning David cried to him from a distance and told him what he had done. Once again, Saul promised not to seek his life.

However, Saul was now becoming more restless as his days drew nearer to death. He was even able to talk to Samuel from the dead, but he did not receive any peace of mind. Finally the Philistines in battle, shot him several times with arrows. Then Saul asked his armorbearer to use the sword on him, but he was afraid and at this point, refused. Saul took matters into his own hands. Since he was not content to live longer, he fell on his own sword to end his life.

LESSON: This lesson shows what happens to those who lead a life of sin. Instead of Saul dying as a great hero for God, he took his own life because of physical pain and a lack of vision to live. How unlike the man David whom he had tried so hard to kill.

David was able to write: "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me to lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside the still waters. He restores my soul; He leads me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for You are with me; Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; You anoint my head with oil; my cup runs over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life;

and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever" (Psalm 23).

#### Chapter 4

#### The Thrill of the Moment

2 Samuel 11; 12:1-11

David, like the apostle Peter, had a dark shadow of weakness to come over his life. He had won victory after victory for the Lord against the Philistines and other nations, but when the soft voice of temptation whispered in David's ear, he listened and yielded! He became guilty of adultery, deceit, and murder.

LESSON: Although we may feel that we are the strongest among God's people, we are constantly in danger of falling. Sin has a way of slipping upon us while we are spiritually sleeping. After David's record of faithfulness, who would imagine him leaving the Lord's will? Thus, we should be reminded of our continual need to be on guard against Satan. "Therefore let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall" (1 Corinthians 10:12).

There are several steps leading to the actual sins committed by David. In 2 Samuel 11:1, the record speaks of a "time when kings go out to battle, that David sent Joab and his servants with him, and all Israel; but David remained at Jerusalem." David was neglecting his king's business. Instead of being in battle, he remained in Jerusalem! If he had been busy, this temptation would not have presented itself. It seems that David was taking a nap for the text says, "Then it happened one evening

that David arose from his bed and walked on the roof of the king's house. And from the roof he saw a woman bathing, and the woman was very beautiful to behold" (11:2).

LESSON: We need to keep ourselves engaged in some useful activity. It is a fact that an idle mind is the devil's workshop! David had dozed away the evening in idleness when he should have been working. "Idleness gives great advantage to the tempter." "Standing waters gather filth." "The bed of sloth often proves the bed of lust." At least, this seems to be the experience of David.

When David saw this beautiful woman, he desired her. Like the sin of Eve, this lust was perceived through his eyes. He wrote among his psalms, "Turn away my eyes from looking at worthless things" (Psalm 119:37). However, on this evening, he lusted for sin that would reflect on his faithfulness to God. He gave in to the desires of the flesh, and laid aside the reasoning and wisdom that he knew should be practiced.

He first inquired as to her identity. He possibly thought she might be single and he would seek to marry her. This would have allowed him to fulfill his desires without committing the sin of adultery.

LESSON: This would not have been the proper basis for marriage, and neither is it the right basis today. Two people should never marry just because they are physically attracted to each other. Yes, this is

important in marriage, but marriage is a lifetime contract and must have as its foundation love and respect. Physical desires for the opposite sex cannot (by itself) hold a couple together. It takes a love of sharing and concern, then all other things will find their places.

When David learned that she was married to Uriah the Hittite, it seems that his desire for her increased. The knowledge of her marriage should have ended his thoughts for her, but he refused to keep his desires under control. The best way to deal with a temptation for an affair is to never begin such. It is so foolish to believe that it is all right to begin an evil relationship and end it later. It is wrong to think JUST of the moment! Only the Lord knows how many hearts have been crushed and how many tears shed over following this thinking!

The question might be asked, "Did David plan to commit adultery from the beginning or did he first intend just to meet her and to enjoy her company?" The Bible does not reveal all of his thoughts, however, keep in mind that this whole experience began by him seeing her bathing, and evidently desiring her. Even if he planned not to get totally involved, he still acted unwisely!

LESSON: In fact, this is the way so many think today, and such thinking often leads to sin. We should never see how close we can get to sin without committing it. "Abstain from every form of evil" (1 Thessalonians 5:22). "Resist the devil and he will flee from you. Draw near to God and He

will draw near to you" (James 4:7,8). We so often think differently from normal when temptation has us under its spell. We should never engage in things that have a tendency to lead us into sin. Let us draw a line far away from the danger mark, keeping our morals high, and we will never regret doing so. Let people call us different, for Christians are different in the way they conduct their lives. If David had worked to keep himself away from temptation, he could have avoided this and many other sins.

David sent for Bathsheba to be brought into his presence, and the sin of adultery was committed. Bathsheba probably consented readily to this sin because David was a great man who had a ruling hand over God's people. However, neither David nor Bathsheba had the right to involve themselves in fleshly practices regardless of the circumstances.

wrong because they gain confidence in the one they are seeing. Although a man is from a Christian family, noted for doing right, and even though he promises to marry in the future, purity and Christian principles should never be surrendered. In fact, a man needs a woman to help him remain strong just as a woman needs help from the man. Sin is dangerous and one shows great wisdom when able to reject its power. The foolish gnat flies with its wings and fools away its life at last, by playing about the candle.

In Chapter 5, we will look closely at the consequences of the sins of David and how they affected his life and the lives of others.

#### Chapter 5

#### The Bitter Fruit

#### 2 Samuel 11; 12:1-11

The sin of adultery not only involved David, but also caused Bathsheba to sin. They both became unfaithful to her husband who was away in battle to protect their lives.

This sin might have been kept a secret from the people, (never from God) but Bathsheba conceived and sent the following message to David; "I am with child" (11:5). David sent for her husband with the evil scheme of getting him to return home so it would appear that the child would be Uriah's instead of David's. However, Uriah refused to enjoy the comforts of home while his fellow-soldiers were sleeping and fighting in the fields.

When this was unsuccessful, David called him to appear so that he could drink before him with the purpose of getting him drunk. This failed because Uriah still did not return to his wife. Therefore, David thought there was only one other thing left to do. He sent a letter to Joab (by the hand of Uriah) saying, "Set Uriah in the forefront of the hottest battle, and retreat from him, that he may be struck down and die" (11:15). Thus, it was done and Uriah was killed. A few days later, David took Bathsheba for his wife and then some time later she

gave birth to a son. "But the thing that David had done displeased the Lord" (11:27).

LESSON: Did you notice how one sin led to another? After adultery was committed, there followed deception, drunkenness, and finally murder. Is this the man whose heart troubled him because he cut off Saul's skirt? Is this he who executed judgment and justice to all his people? Yes, but how much he has changed! This is proof that we should never surrender our lives to sin. Sin is like a chain made up of many links that grows to become longer and stronger in our lives until it is very difficult to stop or break.

Once these sins were committed, David thought all was going well. He must have deceived himself in believing that God had approved. After all, he was the king of Israel and Uriah only a soldier. Nothing is indicated from the text that he felt any guilt. How will God convince David that he has done wrong? God chose one of His outstanding prophets, Nathan, to show David his sins. How did Nathan convince him? Did he approach him and say, "David, you were wrong in having Uriah put to death and in taking his wife? No, David would have defended his actions.

Nathan approached David and told him a story. "There were two men in one city, one rich and the other poor. The rich man had exceedingly many flocks and herds, but the poor man had nothing, except one little ewe lamb which he had bought and nourished; and it grew up together with him and with his children. It ate of his own food and drank from his own cup and

lay in his bosom; and it was like a daughter to him" (12:1-3). Nathan continues the story by telling of a visitor who came to the house of the rich man. To prepare a meal for his guest, instead of getting a lamb from his own flock, the rich man took the poor man's lamb, slew it, and prepared it.

"Then David's anger was greatly aroused against the man, and he said to Nathan, 'As the Lord lives, the man who has done this shall surely die! And he shall restore fourfold for the lamb, because he did this thing and because he had no pity.' Then Nathan said to David, "You are the man"(12:5-7).

LESSON: It is so easy to see the faults of others, but often difficult to see our own. When we look at our lives and the lives of others through binoculars, we see things differently. For ex-ample, when looking at others, we turn the binoculars so that everything is magnified, but when looking at our own faults, we turn them so that all is made smaller. David had overlooked the magnitude of his sins, but could see the wrong of this rich man who stole his neighbor's lamb.

After Nathan told David he was the man, he backed up his accusation with these words: "Thus says the Lord God of Israel: I anointed you king over Israel, and I delivered you from the hand of Saul. I gave you your master's house and your master's wives into your keeping, and gave you the house of Israel and Judah. And if that had been too little, I also would have given you

much more! Why have you despised the commandment of the Lord, to do evil in His sight? You have killed Uriah the Hittite with the sword; you have taken his wife to be your wife, and have killed him with the sword of the people of Ammon" (12:7-9).

How guilty David must have felt after hearing these words from God! He must have remembered them the rest of his life. In fact, many of the psalms written by this sweet singer of Israel reflect the sadness and repentance he felt in his heart.

LESSON: When you do wrong, do you feel guilty? We should, and then make every effort to make things right. It is so dangerous to harden our hearts to the point that we feel no guilt from sin. Committing sin is a serious thing, and must be made right with God. Therefore, keep a tender heart that feels guilt and longs to be forgiven when sin is committed.

At this point, David confessed to Nathan, "I have sinned against the Lord: (12:13). Nathan responded with a message from God: "The Lord also has put away your sin; you shall not die. However, because by this deed you have given great occasion to the enemies of the Lord to blaspheme, the child also who is born to you shall surely die" (12:13,14).

Nathan had delivered a true message from God. For the son died just as he had foretold, but through deep repentance and prayer, David was able to live a profitable and useful life before God. He learned many

lessons from his mistakes, and seemed to try harder to live closer to God.

LESSON: As we live daily, we are also tempted to sin. It may or may not be the same temptations of David, but the principles are the same. We need to recognize that we have sinned, make them right with God, and then learn from our failures. God not only forgives, but He also gives us strength to grow stronger if we are His children.

It is hoped that your life will be enriched by the studying of this great king, David. Remember, God blessed David when he did right, and punished him when he did wrong. Why not resolve to be a faithful Christian and always try to please God as long as you live!



### Chapter 6 Practical Lesson - 1

### **Anyone For Basketball?**

Our practical story today is about a young man named Ted. Let me first tell you something about him. Ted was reared on a farm and had learned at a very early age to appreciate nature. One Sunday morning a lady came forward and placed her membership with the congregation. She was from Nelleville, a town some thirty miles away. On Monday, after placing her membership, she called Ted and asked to meet with him. She assured him that she had some information that she considered very important. This was somewhat surprising to Ted since he had met her only once. However, she seemed sincere, and he agreed to meet her at one of the fast food places in town. Ted knew only that her name was Sarah Brown.

After ordering Cokes, and exchanging a few words about the church, Sarah began. "I hope you won't think I'm meddling in someone else's business, but when I saw you with Jill, I had to talk with you." With surprise, Ted asked, "How did you know Jill's name?" Sarah continued, "Jill is from Nelleville, and I have known her for several years. I'm assuming you don't know what I'm about to tell you since I understand you are a fine Christian young man. Jill is married to Neil Young, a fine young man in that community." Ted turned

pale and said, "Did you say, married?" "Yes," continued Sarah, "She left her husband a few months ago and no one knows of her whereabouts! I don't know any details as to why she left her husband, I just know that this Jill is a married woman."

Sarah finished her Coke as Ted sat almost in silence. Finally, she said, "I must go. I'm sorry to bring you such upsetting news!" Ted thanked her kindly, and she left him about as shocked and lonely as a human being can get. He really loved Jill, and hoped to marry her after graduation. Why had she kept this from him. He thought, "If I had known, I would have made every possible effort not to get involved with her!" As he pondered his situation, he asked himself over and over, "What am I going to do? I can't give her up." At this point he thought of her husband. "Wonder what he is like? Does he love her like I do?" Then thoughts came through Ted's mind that had never been there before. "Maybe he will get killed so I can have Jill!" He couldn't believe he was thinking these thoughts. As he left for home, he kept hoping all of this was a dream, from which he would awaken. Or, maybe Sarah has lied! However, down deep in his heart, he knew that his dilemma was real.

In our next lesson, we will follow Ted as he deals with this serious problem in his life. Remember, the only way to face any problem, regardless of how large it may be, is to seek God's help!

# **Chapter 10**

# **Practical Lesson - 5**

# **Facing Temptations**

For the next week, Ted tried to stay in his room when he was home, but he could not hide his sadness from his parents. As to Jill, she admitted that she was married when Ted told her that he knew the truth about her, but she refused to talk about her past. She finally asked, "Does this mean that you can't date me anymore?" Ted knew the right answer to this question, but the wrong answer came out, "No, no, I can't give you up. I'll think of something."

Each time they were together, Ted wanted her more than ever before. He had heard that forbidden fruit is the most desired, and now he knew this to be a fact from experience. Ted had grown cold and indifferent toward the church and his Bible class, but no one knew how to help him. He had built a wall between himself and his friends.

# **Living A Lie**

One evening when Ted came in from school, after practicing late in the gym, his parents asked if they could talk with him. He resented this, but knew they had the right to talk. They all sat down together at the kitchen table and his dad began the conversation. "Ted, I'll get right to the point. We have heard rumors that

Jill has been married before." Ted looked up with anger in his eyes, "Who told you a story like that?" Ted's mother responded, "Never mind where we heard, is it true?" Without looking up, Ted answered, "Certainly not! Surely you don't believe all that gossip!" As he heard his words, he could not believe they were coming from his mouth. He had always prided himself in the fact that he told the truth, but this is different, he thought, I just can't tell them the truth about Jill.

Since his parents trusted him and had known him to be so truthful all of his life, they accepted his word, and excused him. The following night was the longest and most miserable night he had ever spent in his whole life. The lie he told his parents kept echoing in his mind. For the first time in his life, Ted was unable to pray. He felt so far away from God.

# Help Is Needed

Brother Jones, Ted's preacher heard the many rumors, and was afraid that Ted was having problems. He wanted to help him, but first felt the need to have all the facts. One lady in the congregation told him that Sarah Brown had hinted that she knew Jill and her family in the past. Therefore, Brother Jones decided that he would visit Sarah. When he arrived at her home and asked about Jill, he assured her that he was seeking this information to help Ted. Sarah started at the beginning and told him all that she knew about Jill, her marriage, and her parents. Before leaving, Brother Jones promised her that what she had told him would be kept strictly confidential, and that it would be used only to help Ted.

For the next step, Brother Jones went to Nelleville and met with Neil, Jill's husband. He found him to be a fine young man very hurt and confused. Neil told Brother Jones all the painful details from beginning to end. When the conversation was over, Brother Jones thanked him kindly and promised that he would look for every opportunity to help.

# **An Important Meeting**

During the following week, Brother Jones called Ted and asked if he could meet with him on Saturday in his office. This was not too unusual since they had often met together in the past to carry out work projects. However, Ted felt that this meeting might be something about his relationship with Jill. When Ted arrived, the two didn't exchange many words until Brother Jones began.

## **A Touching Story**

Ted, I want to tell you a true story and get your opinion on what should be done. Ted settled back to listen. Brother Jones began: "There was a young couple that dated for several months and fell deeply in love. They decided to get married, and to spend the rest of their lives together. However, from the day they were married, her parents resented her husband, and week after week they tried everything to break them up. At first, the couple was so happy that they ignored them, but finally this developed into serious problems. There was nothing her parents would not do to make him look bad in the eyes of their daughter. They lied about many

things, and even accused him of being unfaithful. After a few months, this brought real problems between them. He would accuse her parents of lying, and she would resent his accusations. This produced hard feelings and heated arguments. They finally reached the point where they neglected each other in their marriage, and stayed angry most of the time.

Finally, one day after a big argument, the girl went home to her parents. They continued their false accusations, and offered the girl a large sum of money if she would leave her husband and move secretly to another town. In all her confusion, this seemed to be the easiest way out, so she accepted the money and moved away.

Sometime later, she met another young man and began dating him. She did not tell him that she was married, but allowed their relationship to develop into love. During this time, her husband was back home feeling broken hearted and cheated by all that had happened to him."

Ted listened with great interest. He could almost feel the pain that her husband was going through. In fact, he thought of Jill, and knew what it was like to love someone that you really couldn't have.

At this point, Brother Jones asked, "Ted, what do you think about this girl's evil parents and the way her husband has been treated?"

Ted was a little angry inside just hearing the story. He said, "This is all wrong. Her parents had no

right to interfere with their lives. She belongs with her husband, and their love should be allowed to grow instead of being killed! Someone should tell her parents that they are wrong in breaking up their daughter's marriage."

Brother Jones leaned forward in his chair, looked Ted in the eyes and said, "Ted, the girl's name is Jill, and you are the one she's dating!"

All was quite as Ted stared away with tears in his eyes. Finally, Brother Jones asked, "How long have you known that Jill was married?" Ted replied, "A few weeks, but I didn't want to accept it. I wanted her for myself so badly that I was willing to lie, cheat, and even secretly wish something would happen to her husband. Brother Jones, I have been wrong--I am so guilty!"

Brother Jones knew that Ted was hurting, but he also knew that he would hurt even more if he didn't face these facts and get his life right with God. Therefore, he continued: "Ted, do you remember a series the teen class studied about two months ago on the life of David?" Ted answer, "Yes, I remember well. I even taught two of the lessons when Nathan was on vacation." Brother Jones asked further, "Do you remember how David fell in love with another man's wife, and the sins that he committed before realizing he had done wrong?" Again, Ted remembered every detail. "Now, Ted, you need to repent of the things you did wrong, ask God to forgive you, and encourage Jill to return to her husband."

For the first time since he learned that Jill was married, Ted could see clearly what had happened. He didn't want anything to keep him from being right with God. Therefore, he resolved to make things right with all he had wronged. He thanked Brother Jones for helping him see the sins in his life.

# **Making Things Right**

Ted also ended his relationship with Jill, and encouraged her to at least meet with her husband and try to work out their problems. Brother Jones had told him that he would be willing to talk with Neil and Jill if they wanted his help.

Although Ted did not go as far as David in his experiences with Bathsheba, he still faced some of the same temptations. Be assured that all of us must work daily to keep our lives from temptations. If we are Christians, the Lord will help us escape temptations. When we put Him first in our lives, all the other things will work for the best.

#### **Conclusion:**

Ted finished his High School years at Bradford High and went to college. While attending college, he met Beth, the finest Christian lady he had ever known. They fell deeply in love and made their plans to get married, and to spend the rest of their lives together. Ted found the greatest joy from his life because he lived daily to follow Jesus. There is not a greater goal

that we can have today than to follow in the footsteps of Jesus our Master and our Lord!

  - 1. Some were evil, some were good
  - 2. Involved in battles, riches, sins of the flesh, and idolatry
- B. In this book, we will study David
  - 1. "Sweet Singer of Israel"
- C. David had his weaknesses
  - Still "Man after God's own heart" (Acts 13:22)
- D. Today we will study, "David a Shepherd boy anointed king:"

#### I. CALL HIM FROM THE FIELD

- A. Lesson begins with David watching his father's sheep
  - 1. God has something special planned for him
  - 2. Let's leave David for a while to see what God has planned
- B. Saul, king of Israel, had disobeyed God

- 1. God wants him removed as king
- God sent Samuel to house of Jesse to anoint one of his sons
  - 1. **(1 Sam. 16:2,3)**
  - 2. Samuel feared God more than Saul, and obeyed
- D. Must have been a thrill for Jesse to learn that one of his sons would be king
  - 1. Tell of his sons preparing to appear before Samuel
  - 2. Looked so great, hard for Samuel to decide
- E Samuel finally chose Eliab
  - 1. Samuel had chosen by outward appearance
  - 2. Read (1 Sam. 16:7).

#### II. LESSON

- A. Samuel chose from his own feelings
  - 1. He needed the help of God
  - 2. Had made same mistake choosing Saul
- B. God chooses by looking at the heart
- C. We can make mistakes about people by judging only their appearance
  - 1. Example: Jesus was refused king by many
- D. (1 Pet. 3:4).

#### III. ALL BROTHERS OF DAVID CONSIDERED

- One by one the other six brothers were considered
  - All were refused.
- B. "Are all the young men here?"
  - 1. Only one who is tending the sheep
  - David: "A clear, fair complexion, good eyes, and a lovely face," (cf. 1 Sam. 16:12; 17:42).
- C. The Lord said, "Arise, anoint him."
  - 1. Samuel anointed him with a horn of oil.

#### IV. LESSON

- A. David was asked to appear to be anointed
- B. We must not boast of our own abilities
  - 1. Strength will be made known
  - David didn't attend the feast, but was anointed king
  - 3. Bible: Take a lower seat, then be invited upward
  - 4. Spend time WORKING not BOASTING!
- C. "Usually the greatest boasters are the smallest workers. The deep rivers pay a larger tribute to the sea than shallow brooks, and they empty themselves with less noise" (Secker).

#### V. SAUL'S REACTION

A. Saul learned of David being anointed

- B. It was recommended that he find a harp player
- C. Music is good therapy, but will not take the place of repentance
- D. Saul needed to confess his sins and repent
- E Then music would have helped him
- F. David had the ability to play the harp
  - 1. Chosen to cheer Saul
  - 2. Learned the palace, and prepared for being the active king.

#### VI. LESSON

- A. Music will not do the impossible
  - 1. Will cheer saddened hearts
  - 2. Will help us face problems
  - 3. Will not forgive sins!
- B. Forgiveness comes through obedience
- C. In spiritual realm, must lift our voices in praise to God
  - 1. Spirit of the Lord departed from him
  - 2. Must have been an empty feeling

#### VII. LESSON

A. God does not come down directly today, but still is present today

- B. If God doesn't rule, Satan will possess us
- C. How can any accountable person live without obeying God?
- D. How can one's soul fall into the condition of Saul?

#### VIII. SAUL NEEDED A PHYSICIAN

- A. Even modern medicine would not have helped Saul
- B. Today, without God, one has nothing
- C. Disobedience brought Saul rejection and sorrow.
- D. Apart from worship, can enjoy good music
- E However, only God can make our lives complete
- F. "Of all the arts beneath the heaven,
  That man has found or God has given,
  None draws the soul so sweet away;
  As music's melting, mystic lay;
  Slight emblem of the bliss above,
  It soothes the spirit all to love."

(Hogg).

#### IX. MUSIC DID NOT CURE SAUL

- A. It helped him temporarily
  - 1. Would not bring him back to God
- B. First be a Christian, then enjoy heart cheering music
- C. For a time, David found favor with Saul
  - 1. However, time will change this relationship!

# Chapter 12

# **Teacher's Notes On Chapter 2**

# The Winner By a Knockout 1 Samuel 17

#### **INTRODUCTION:**

- A. After playing the harp, David returned to the sheep
  - 1. A youth, but had much faith and trust
- B. War was going on between Israel and Philistines
  - Saul had lost favor with God, but was still leading His army
  - 2. <u>David's brothers:</u> Eliab, Abimadah, and Shammah in army
- C. Jesse sent David to take brothers parched corn, ten loaves of bread and ten cheeses
  - 1. David got up early to carry out this job.

#### I. LESSON

- A. When we have work to do, need to get up early to accomplish it
  - 1. Laziness can become a disease
  - 2. Example: birds up early seeking food
- B. Something refreshing about a new day
  - 1. Inspires us to succeed and honor God

Man needs to imitate God's creatures in this way.

#### II. GOLIATH DEFIES ISRAEL

- A. David heard that Goliath, a giant, was defying God's army
  - 1. Giant 11 ft. tall, with a strong armor
- B. Goliath challenged a fight with a man of Israel
  - Kill me and we will be your servants
  - 2. Saul's men were afraid
- C. David could not understand their fear
  - 1. They were on God's side.

#### III. LESSON

- A. Must never try to solve our problems without God
  - 1. Christians can call on His help in prayer
- B. Nothing is impossible within God's will
  - 1. David knew that God would help.

#### IV. DAVID'S OLDEST BROTHER WAS JEALOUS

- A. He (Eliab) began mocking David
- B. Questioned his motives for coming to them
  - 1. Came only to see battle
  - 2. Overlooked the kindness of David

- 3. When one is jealous, he is also ungrateful
- C. Emphasized that David was only a shepherd boy

#### V. LESSON

- A. Often a problem for brothers and sisters to get along
- B. Older should realize that the younger are looking for guidance
- C. Brothers and sisters can be cruel to each other
  - Still may stand up for each other when outsiders attack.

## VI. SAUL SENT FOR DAVID

- A. Saul heard about what David was saying; sent for him
- B. David asked permission to meet the giant
  - Saul objected first that he was only a vouth
  - 2. Saul did not consider that God was on his side
- C. David told Saul about bear and lion entering the sheep
  - 1. God helped him slay both
  - 2. Pointed out that the same power would help him slay the giant

- D. Saul said, "Go, and the Lord be with you!" (v. 37).
- E Saul provided David an armor, but he refused it
  - 1. Wanted to meet giant in same way he met bear and lion
  - 2. With staff, five smooth stones, and a sling, he met the giant.

#### VII. LESSON

- A. That which was so small, God made strong
  - David allowed God to use him in spite of weaknesses
- B. Even if our talents are small today, God can help us
  - 1. God can use us to lead thousands to Christ
- C. Instead of complaining of weaknesses, use same strength to allow God to work through us
  - 1. Will be amazed at what God can do!

#### VIII. THE REACTION OF THE GIANT

- A. The giant was humiliated when he saw David
  - 1. "Am I a dog, that you come to me with sticks" (vss. 43, 44).
  - 2. David was not frightened
  - 3. Assured the giant that Jehovah would help him slay him

- 4. "This day the Lord will deliver you into my hand, and I will strike you and take your head from you" (v. 46)
- B. With a stone and sling, David buried a stone in forehead of giant
  - 1. Although tall, strong, and a boaster, fell to earth
  - 2. David took the giant's sword, cut off his head
- C. With God's help, a large army was defeated.

#### IX. LESSON

- A. Sometimes youth are made to feel no place until older
  - 1. They are part of the church today as well as tomorrow.

# **Teacher's Notes - For Chapter 3**

# **Run For Your Life**

1 Samuel, 18-31

#### INTRODUCTION:

- A. Natural for David to become a hero after slaying the giant
  - 1. He had done the King's job
  - 2. Temptation for David to become conceited, but he didn't!
  - 3. David still considered Saul the king
- B. When David and Saul returned from battle, women danced and sang:
  - 1. "Saul has slain his thousands, and David his ten thousands" (18:7).
  - 2. Although David was innocent, from this time forward, Saul was jealous
  - 3. Saul began hating David.

## I. <u>LESSON</u>

- A. Many people suffer over things they cannot help
  - Have you ever mocked people with physical handicaps or because of a different skin color?
  - 2. This is wrong!

- 3. Example: Old West and Indians
- B. David wanted to be a friend with Saul
  - 1. Saul would not permit it.

#### II. SAUL TRIED TO KILL DAVID

- A. Later, David was playing the harp for Saul
  - 1. An evil spirit entered Saul
  - 2. He threw spear at David and said,
  - 3. "I will pin David to the wall with it" (18:11)
  - 4. This happened twice.
- B. Notice another plot to kill David
  - Saul offered David his daughter Michal for wife
  - 2. Required a dangerous condition-Pay:
  - 3. "one hundred foreskins of the Philistines, to take vengeance on the king's enemies" (18:25).
    4. Saul thought David would be killed
  - Saul thought David would be killed carrying this out
  - 5. David responded by presenting Saul with two hundred foreskins
  - 6. David then married Machal, Saul's daughter.

#### III. A TRUE FRIEND

A. Jonathan, Saul's son, was a true friend to David

- On one occasion Jonathan convinced his father not to kill David since he had saved Israel by slaying the giant
- Saul soon broke his promise and sought David.
- B. David's wife Michal, also helped David escape from Saul
  - 1. She let David down through window--placed image in bed
  - 2. When men came to get David, she told them he was sick
  - 3. Later they took image to Saul, and he was angry with Michal
  - 4. She told her father, "He said to me, 'Let me go! Why should kill you' " (19:17).
- C. David and Jonathan made a plan to warn David
  - David would hide near place where Jonathan practiced shooting arrows
  - 2. Lad would get arrows
  - 3. "Look, the arrows are beyond you" Saul was angry"Look, the arrows are on the side of you; get them and come," Saul was peaceful,(20:20-23).
- D. Saul attempted to kill Jonathan because of his friendship with David
  - 1. The arrow message Saul is angry.

## IV. LESSON

A. A loyal friend is like a precious jewel

- Will stand by you through good and bad times
- 2. Jonathan was this kind of friend to David
- B. Solomon: "A man who has friends must himself be friendly, but there is a friend who sticks closer than a brother" (Prov. 18:24).
- C. Saul had Ahimelech a priest and other priests killed
  - 1. Because he gave David bread to eat
  - 2. He also gave David the sword of Goliath
- Saul commanded his evil servant Doeg to kill the priests
  - 1. "You turn and kill the priests! So Doeg the Edomite turned and struck the priests, and killed on that day eighty-five men who wore a linen ephod" (22:18).

#### V. LESSON

- A. Hatred and jealousy can eat our hearts away
  - 1. This sin will grow if we allow it to do so
- B. It was disobedience, hatred, and jealousy that destroyed Saul and his hope for the future.

#### VI. DAVID MEANT SAUL NO HARM

- A. While Saul was in a cave, David slipped and cut off the corner of his robe
- B. David later followed from a distance and cried out:
  - 1. "I could have slain you, but I didn't"
  - 2. David tried to convince Saul that he meant him no harm
- C. Saul pretended friendship, but it was only pretense!

#### VII. DAVID MARRIES ABIGAIL

- A. Woman named Abigail was married to evil man, Nabal
  - 1. David asked Nabal a favor--refused
  - David considered slaying Nabal, but Abigail showed him that this would be wrong
- B. A few days later God killed Nabal
  - 1. David then married Abigail.

#### VIII. HATRED CONTINUED.

- A. Saul began seeking David's life again
- B. David found Saul asleep with his army
  - Slipped in and took his sword and jug of water
  - 2. Spared Saul's life

- C. Next morning called from a distance and told Saul what he had done
- D. Saul once again promised not to seek his life.

## IX. SAUL THE LOSER

- A. Saul became even more restless
  - 1. Sought Samuel from the dead, but received a death message
- B. Went to battle against the Philistines
  - 1. They shot Saul several times with arrows
  - 2. Saul commanded his armorbearer to kill him
  - 3. The armorbearer was afraid and refused
- Saul ended his own life by falling on his sword.

## X. <u>LESSON</u>

- A. What a lesson to show that comes from a life of sin
- B. Saul was far from dying a hero
- C. Compare David to Saul--David was the true hero
  - 1. David was able to write:
  - 2. "The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me to lie down in green pastures: he leads me beside the still waters. He restores

my soul; he leads me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for You are with me; Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; You anoint my head with oil; my cup runs over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever." (Ps. 23).

# **Teacher's Notes - For Chapter 4**

# The Thrill of the Moment 2 Samuel 11: 12:1-11

#### **INTRODUCTION:**

- A. David was a great man
  - 1. But like the apostle Peter, he had a weak time
- B. Won victory after victory for the Lord
  - 1. Listened and yielded to the soft voice of temptation
  - 2. Became guilty of adultery, deceit, and murder.

## I. LESSON

- A. Even the strongest are in danger of yielding to temptations
  - 1. Sin can slip upon us
  - 2. Especially if we are spiritually sleeping
- B. Several steps that led to David's sins
  - 1. The first step seems to be idleness
  - 2. 2 Sam. 11:1, records a "time when kings go out to battle, that David sent Joab and his servants with him, and all Israel; but David remained at Jerusalem."

- 3. David was neglecting the King's business
- 4. If he had been in battle, he would have avoided the temptation
- C. Seems that David was taking a nap "Then it happened one evening that David arose from his bed and walked on the roof of the king's house. And from the roof he saw a woman bathing, and the woman was very beautiful to behold" (11:2).

#### II. LESSON

- A. We need to keep ourselves involved in useful activities
  - 1. It is true, "an idle mind is the Devil's workshop"
  - 2. "Idleness gives great advantage to the tempter"
  - 3. "Standing waters gather filth"
  - 4. "The bed of sloth often proves the bed of lust."

## III. DAVID LUSTED THROUGH HIS EYES

- A. He saw and desired this beautiful woman
  - 1. Like Eve, lust was perceived through the eyes
- B. David wrote: "Turn away my eyes from looking at worthless things" (Ps. 119:37).

- C. On this occasion, David lusted for sin that reflected on his faithfulness to God
  - 1. David gave in to the desires of his flesh
  - 2. He laid aside reasoning and wisdom
- D. David first inquired as to her identity
  - 1. May have thought she was single
  - 2. If so, could have fulfilled desires through marriage.

#### IV. LESSON

- A. Physical attraction alone is not a true basis for marriage
  - 1. Couples should not marry just because they are attracted to each other
  - 2. This is important in marriage, but love and respect must also be present
  - 3. Marriage in God's sight is a lifetime commitment.

## V. FORBIDDEN FRUIT WAS MORE APPEALING.

- A. She was married to Uriah the Hittite
  - 1. David seems to want her even more
  - He refused to keep his desires under control
- B. The best way to deal with temptation for an affair:
  - 1. Never begin
  - 2. It is foolish to begin an affair believing it can be ended later
  - 3. It is wrong to think only of the moment

- 4. Such thoughts and practices have crushed many hearts
- C. Did David plan to commit adultery from the beginning?
  - 1. The Bible does not say
  - 2. However, the whole experience began by seeing and desiring her
  - 3. Surely David acted unwisely!

#### VI. LESSON

- A. Many today get caught by not planning to get totally involved
  - 1. We should never see how close we can get to sin
  - 2. "Abstain from every form of evil" (1 Thes. 5:22).
  - 3. "Resist the devil and he will flee from you. Draw near to God and He will draw near to you" (Jas. 4:7,8).
- B. We think differently when temptation has us under its spell
  - 1. Never engage in things that lead to sin
  - Draw a line far away from the danger mark
  - 3. Work daily to keep morals high
  - 4. Let others call us different-- Christians are different!
  - 5. If David had worked to keep from temptation would have avoided these sins.

## VII. ADULTERY WAS COMMITTED

- A. David sent for Bathsheba and adultery was committed
  - 1. Bathsheba may have consented because of David's position
  - 2. Both were wrong regardless of the circumstances.

#### VIII. <u>LESSON</u>

- A. Many women and young girls go wrong because they gain confidence in the one they are dating
  - 1. Many men and young men do the same
  - 2. Regardless of who the person may be, Christian principles must never be surrendered
  - 3. A man needs a woman, and a woman needs a man to help keep each other strong
  - 4. Sin is strong great wisdom is shown when resisted
- B. Example: "The foolish gnat flies with its wings and fools away its life at last, by playing about the candle."
- C. In Chapter 15, we will consider the consequences of David's sins
  - 1. We will look at how his sins affected his life, and the lives of others.

# **Chapter 15 Teacher's Notes - For Chapter 5**

# The Bitter Fruit

2 Samuel 11; 12:1-11

#### INTRODUCTION:

- A. The sin of adultery involved both David and Bathsheba
  - Both became unfaithful to her husband, Uriah
- B. This sin could not be kept a secret from God
  - Neither from the people--Bathsheba conceived
  - 2. Her message to David was, "I am with child" (11:5).

## I. DAVID BEGINS HIS EVIL SCHEMES

- A. Sent for her husband (Uriah) to come home from battle
  - Wants him home so it will appear that the child is his
  - However, Uriah refused the comforts of home while his fellow- soldiers were sleeping and fighting in the field
- B. David met with Uriah and got him drunk
  - 1. Uriah still refused to go in the house to his wife

- C. When all this failed, David planned murder
  - Sent a letter to the battlefield by Uriah to Joab saying:
  - 2. "Set Uriah in the forefront of the hottest battle and retreat from him, that he may be struck down and die" (11:15).
    - 3. This was done and Uriah was killed
- D. A few days later, David married Bathsheba
  - 1. At the proper time she gave birth to a son
  - 2. "But the thing that David had done displeased the Lord" (11:27).

#### II. LESSON

- A. Notice how that with David, one sin led to another
  - Adultery, deception, drunkenness, and murder
  - 2. Is this the same man who was troubled because he cut off Saul's skirt?
  - 3. Is this the same man who executed judgment and justice to his people?
  - 4. Yes, but so much has changed
  - 5. This is proof that we should never surrender our lives to sin
- B. Sin is like a chain made up of many lengths
  - 1. Such grows stronger and longer-difficult to stop.

## III. DAVID DECEIVED HIMSELF

- A. Believed all was well and that God approved
  - 1. He was king and Uriah was only a soldier
  - 2. Nothing from the text indicates any guilt
- B. How will God show David that he has done wrong?
  - God chose Nathan the prophet to show David
  - 2. Could not simply say to David that he had done wrong
- C. Approached the subject by telling David a story
  - 1. "There were two men in one city; the one rich, and the other poor. The rich man had exceedingly many flocks and herds. But the poor man had nothing, except one little ewe lamb, which he had bought and nourished; and it grew up together with him, and his children. It ate of his own food, and drank from his own cup, and lay in his bosom, and was like a daughter to him" (2 Samuel 12:1-3).
  - 2. He continues by telling of a visitor who came to the rich man's house:
  - 3. Then David's anger was greatly aroused against the man, and he said to Nathan, "As the LORD lives, the man who has done this shall surely die! And he shall restore fourfold for the lamb, because he did this thing and because he had no pity." And Nathan

said to David, 'You are the man!' (2 Samuel 12:5-7).

## IV. LESSON

- A. Easy to see faults of others difficult to see our own
  - 1. Look at others with binoculars magnifying
  - Look at own with binoculars making faults smaller
- B. David had overlooked own sins, but could see faults of rich man

#### V. YOU ARE THE MAN

- A. Nathan backs up his accusation with these words:
  - "Thus says the LORD God of Israel, I anointed you king over Israel, and I delivered you out of the hand of Saul. I gave you your master' s house, and your master's wives into your keeping, and gave you the house of Israel and of Judah. And if that had been too little, I also would have given you much more. Why have you despised the commandment of the LORD, to do evil in His sight? You have killed Uriah the Hittite with the sword; you have taken his wife to be your wife, and have killed him with the sword of the people of Ammon" (2 Samuel 12:7-9).

- B. This must have made David feel guilty
  - Must have remembered these words the rest of his life
  - 2. Many of the Psalms of this "Sweet singer of Israel" reflect his repentance.

#### VI. LESSON

- A. Do you feel guilty when you do wrong?
  - 1. We should, and we should make every effort to make things right
- B. Dangerous to reach the point where we feel no guilt from sin
  - 1. Committing sin is a serious thing
  - 2. Must be made right with God
  - 3. Keep a tender heart that feels guilt and seeks forgiveness for sins.

## VII. DAVID CONFESSES SIN TO NATHAN

- A. "I have sinned against the Lord" (12:13).
- B. Nathan gave a message from God:
  - 1. "And David said unto Nathan, 'The LORD also has put away your sin; you shall not die. However, because by this deed you have given great occasion to the enemies of the LORD to blaspheme, the child also who is born to you shall surely die.' " (2 Samuel 12:13,14).

- C. This message was true
  - 1. The son died
  - David lived a profitable and useful life before God
  - 3. Learned many lessons from his mistakes
  - Seemed to live closer to God.

## VIII. <u>LESSON</u>

- A. As we live, we are tempted daily
  - 1. May not be the same temptation of David
  - 2. Principles are the same
- B. Need to recognize that we have sinned
  - 1. Then make them right with God
  - 2. Learn from our failures
- God forgives and gives His children strength to grow stronger

# IX. RESOLVE TO LIVE FOR GOD

- A. Hope your life will be enriched from studying King David
  - 1. Also the practical lessons based on his life
- B. Remember, God blessed David when he did right
  - 1. Punished him when he did wrong
- C. Why not resolve to be a faithful Christian
  - 1. Try to please God as long as you live!



## Game For Chapter 1

## A Call To Be King

## **BIBLE BOWLING**

#### **OBJECT:**

The object of Bible Bowling is to reach the strike zone by answering Bible questions. The questions for this game are based on David being anointed king as a shepherd boy. While seeking to make the highest score, hopefully the students will learn more about the Bible.

## **Things Needed**

- 1. Prepare a game board.
- Step 1: Prepare the game board as shown in the diagram from 1/4" plywood covered with alternate colors of flannel to distinguish sections. The pins in the strike zone are 1-1/2" in diameter black circles.
- Step 2: Install the board on a wall in front of the class, or attach it to a portable chalkboard.
- Step 3: Make bowling balls (use pattern) on stiff poster board 2" in diameter (glue sandpaper to the back of each ball for flannel. Numbers one through the number of students youexpect (plus extras). If

- you expect 20 students, prepare at least 25. Be sure you have enough.
- Step 4: Cut out the player's circle. Cut a circle (18" in diameter) from a corrugated box. Paint it with acrylic house wall paint and print on it PLAYER.
- Step 5: Cut out 30 pins and glue or tape a question on each pin. Place these in a box. When its' a player's turn, let he or she stand on the "Player's Circle"

## HOW TO PLAY THE GAME

- 1. Place balls (based on the exact number of students) in the box and allow each student to draw his or her ball. The student receiving ball #1 will go first, ball #2, second, etc.
- When it is a player's turn, let he or she stand on 2. the "PLAYER'S" circle. From the box where questions have been stirred well, draw out a pin and ask it's question. (Do not place this pin back into the box until another game). If they answer correctly, take their ball and place it on square #1 for 6 points. Then move to the next student with ball #2. Repeat this pattern until all students have had a turn, and then begin round two. After seven rounds, the student (or students) with the highest score, wins the game. If more than one reaches the strike zone or ties for the highest score (short of the strike zone), declare them ALL winners! To make a strike is to make a total score of 100 points. Try NOT to close the game in the middle of a round so that all will have an equal opportunity to win. If you run out of questions, place all

- questions back into the box and go over them again. Repetition is a great way to learn!
- 3. Optional: If you choose, you may give a Bible or Bible related prize for a single winner. Only if one student makes a strike above the entire class.

## **Game For Chapter 2**

## The Winner By A Knockout

## **BIBLE SHUFFLE**

## **Things Needed**

- Make 2 disks, 3" in diameter. Saw with a band or scroll saw from 3/4" lumber. Paint one red and the other blue. You may cement a picture of an open Bible on each disk if you wish.
- 2. Make 2 cue sticks for the game. (It might be a good idea to make a couple of extra ones in case one gets broken). Paint one red and the other blue. For handles, use a 1/2" by 36" dowel stick. Use pattern to saw disk holder from a 2 by 4 (1-1/2" by 3-1/2") with a band or scroll saw. Drill a 1/2" hole and insert (with glue) dowel stick handle.
- 3. Prepare floor diagram from pattern. This can be done with masking tape, or a permanent diagram with paint to be used often. Place a line of masking tape at the proper distance (according to the group) for students to stand to play the game. Somewhere between 10 ft. and 16 ft.

## **How To Play The Game**

- 1. Divide students equally into 2 teams (number them 1-2, 1-2, etc.). The "ones" are the "Red team" and the "twos" are the "Blue team."
- 2. Line up both teams, and give a cue to the first player on each team.
- 3. Each takes a turn shoving or sliding the disk to the diagram. Each player gets to try 2 times to land on a number. After 2 tries, landing on or off the diagram, the next team has a tern. After two misses, or landing on a number, the student gives the cue to his or her next player.
- 4. When a player lands the disk on a number, he or she receives a Bible question from that number. (You can use question board used in Chapter 19 to hold your questions on the proper numbers). If answered correctly, their team gets that same number added to their score. <a href="Example: If they land on "10" go to the question under ten.">Example: If they land on "10" go to the question under ten. The ten should be the most difficult set of questions, but gives 10 points when answered correctly. TEAM MATES MUST NOT HELP THEIR PLAYER ANSWER!</a>
- 5. Total up scores at the end of the period and announce the team winner.

#### **Rules**

1. The number landed on represents the question category or number to be used.

- 2. If the disk lands on a line between two numbers, choose the number with the most disk on it. If it appears equal, give the student a choice.
- 3. If disk is mostly outside the diagram, but still touching a number, the number counts.

## **Run For Your Life**

## WHEEL OF BIBLE

## **Things Needed**

- 1. Overhead projector, screen, and marker for transparencies.
- 2. An overhead transparency. Make a transparency from the puzzle page in this book on a copying machine or make up your own. Cut shall pieces of paper the size of each puzzle phrase and cover all except the first one. Tape these pieces of paper on the transparency with removable tape so that you can uncover each phrase as you need it.
- 3. Have a co-helper sit near the projector with all phrases filled in on paper ready to assist you as to where the letters are found.
- 4. Use questions from the Question Section.

# **How to Play The Game**

1. Divide students into two teams - Team 1 and Team 2

- 2. Ask the first student in team 1 a Bible question. If he or she answers correctly, they have the right to request a letter for the puzzle from A to Z. (vowels and consonants are treated as the same).
- 3. If there is one (or more) write the letters into the proper squares in RED for Team 1. (Co-worker tells you which squares). Give 5 points to team 1 for each time the letter appears. Example: If they ask for an "E" and there are two, they get 10 points. After letters are in place, they can try to solve the puzzle. If they can't, then move to the first player on Team 2. (Note; write letters in blue for Team 2). Go back and forth from team to team until the puzzle is solved.
- No help can be obtained from other members of the team. If they do, the player is disqualified for that turn.
- 5. The first student to solve the puzzle, gives to their team an additional 100 points. This is added to all the other points already gained (total the score for each color) before the puzzle was solved.
- Let Co-worker keep the score for both teams.

#### The Thrill of the Moment

# **KNOW YOUR BIBLE**

## **Things Needed**

- 1. A portable Dry Erase Marker Board or use a chalk board
- 2. Dry erase markers or chalk

## **Things To Make**

- 1. Make a question board holder.
  - a. Cut a piece of 1 by 4, lumber 45 inches long
  - b. Begin at one end and mark a line every 5 inches
  - c. Center a nail (8d finish) on each line. These nails will hold the eight groups of questions. Place a number under each nail with vinyl numbers (1 thru 8).
  - d. From a short piece of 1 by 4, lumber, make two brackets to hang the question board holder to the top of the dry erase marker board. (see pattern).
- 2. Prepare 3 by 5 index cards by punching a hole at the center on one end. Write a question on each card with its value number on the back. (Divide questions into eight (8) categories--the higher the number the more difficult the question).

- 3. Have all categories of cards hanging on the nails before the students arrive.
- 4. Divide the dry erase marker board in half by drawing a vertical line.
- 5. Draw two score cards, one on each half, maximum size that the board will allow.
- 6. Label the left half of the board "Team 1," and the other half, "Team 2."

## **HOW TO PLAY THE GAME**

- 1. Divide students equally into two teams, as you face them, call those on your right "Team 1," and those on your left, "Team 2."
- 2. Divide players on both teams into groups of 3's.
- 3. Begin with either "Team 1" or "Team 2" and allow the first group to choose a number, 1 thru 8. (Remind them that the larger the number, the more difficult the question).
- 4. Remove a card from the number they choose and ask them the question. If they answer correctly, place that number on the score card of their team. Example: If they choose 5 and answer correctly, place a 5 on score card under 5, etc.
- 5. They cannot get help from other team members. If they can't answer the question, allow anyone on

- either team to answer, but no points are scored. Go back and forth from team to team until all student groups are used; then start over.
- 6. If time will not allow the game to be finished, and the score cards are not filled, simply add total points for each team. The highest total of points is the winner!

- 4. A large diagram drawn on the board with each block numbered from 1 thru 9.


## **How To Play The Game**

- 1. Divide class equally into two divisions, "Team 1" and "Team 2." (Let Team 1 be X's and Team 2, be O's).
- 2. Divide each team into groups of 2's.
- 3. Have Bible questions on 3 by 5 index cards, and be sure they are shuffled well.
- 4. Begin with one of the teams, and let the first couple choose a square (number) 1 thru 9.
- 5. Ask them a question. If they answer correctly, place either a "X" or "O" in that chosen square.

- 6. Then move over to the next team. Go back and forth until one team can draw a line as in the game "tictac-toe"
- 7. If the cat gets the game, play on until all squares are filled. Then add up the squares with X's, and the squares with O's.
- 8. Erase the X's and O's from all squares and begin another game.
- 9. If a team wins the round, they get 100 points. The loser still gets the total number from the squares where they were able to place a "X" or "O."
- 10. At the end of period, the team with the most points, wins!




